








How Do You Ride The School Bus? Get ready early, so you won't have to hurry. Wear clothes that will keep you visible and ...




When you walk to and from the bus, remember to follow the safety rules.




If something goes wrong ... STAY CALM!











We get to the school bus on time.



We get on the bus single file, without pushing.



Good Behavior on the bus helps prevent a traffic crash.

We sit in our seats on the bus, and keep the aisle clear of books, lunch boxes, musical instruments, and arms and legs. We never throw things inside or outside of the bus windows. Our head, hands, and arms are safest inside the bus, so we don't stick ANYTHING out the windows.

We talk quietly to our friends — NEVER SHOUT.
The bus driver must hear the horns of cars and trucks. We're especially quiet at railroad crossings,



Sit quietly in our seats. Keep the aisle clear. Never shout, throw things, or stick anything out of the window.
